
Hello History people

I sent the following email to some people I know, and thought it may interest you all.

There has been recent news of bodies being found from climbing Mount Nanda Devi in India, which is the second highest mountain in India (although Everest, the highest mountain, is also claimed as being in Nepal and Tibet).

It may be thought, but mistakenly, that it is the second highest mountain in the world.

It is, however, the 23rd highest mountain in the world.

Mount K2 is the second highest mountain in the world - named after an explorer in the area - Mt Godwin Austen, near Gilgit in N. Pakistan in the Karakoram range.

(Those at school in the Himalayas already know this).
