## **Soviet secret-police organisations**

Here is the timeline of Soviet secret-police organizations:

**Cheka:** 1917–1922 (dissolved)

**GPU**: 1922–1923 (transferred from being a branch of the NKVD, which had primarily been responsible for general policing to the Council of People's Commissars and becomes a secret police organization)

**OGPU:** 1923–1934 (dissolved and re-incorporated as new NKVD)

**NKVD** (new): 1934–1943 (state-security functions split off into "NKGB", a separate entity)

**NKGB** (1943–1946) (dissolved and reconstituted as MGB — Ministry for State Security; the remaining remnant of NKVD is dissolved and reconstituted as MVD — Ministry of Internal Affairs)

MGB (1946–1953) (dissolved as part of post-Beria restructuring of the security apparatus)

**KGB** (1954–1991)

Ayn Rand, who left Russia in 1925, would have lived through Cheka, GPU and OGPU. There is considerable continuity between these agencies, and constantly mentioning all three is unwieldy, so I mostly referred to GPU and occasionally Cheka. Russian literature of that time period refers to GPU to mean GPU or OGPU.

On 3 December 1991, the KGB was officially dissolved. It was later succeeded in Russia by the Foreign Intelligence Service (SVR) and what would later become the Federal Security Service (FSB).
